After Ambapali Bihar Emporium at Connaught Place, the artistic prowess of Bihar gets another permanent shelf in the form of 'Bihar Niwas Art Kiosk'

The Bihar Niwas Art Kiosk aims to bring thought-provoking Installation Art, bringing the finest handcrafts and handloom from different regions of Bihar at one place. Prominent artforms like Manjusha, Madhubani, Sikki, Sujani, Paper Mache, Bawan Booti, Obra and many others from the regions of Mithila, Tirhut, Magadh, Ang and Bhojpur have been installed in the shelves of the kiosks for the buyers and visitors.

Artists, weavers, craftspersons and curators from different regions of Bihar have been invited to realize their ambitious site-specific commissions- with the assistance of local volunteers, artists and vendors. Each artist has researched the walled city of Delhi and its historical significance to conceive their new exhibition so that each craft is meaningful and relevant to the buyers and visitors.

Various masterpieces sent by the artists from Bihar will be displayed at the Kiosk and will be available for the buyers. These item can be purchased directly from the artists via digital payments.


The name of this art form also holds an interesting story. The Sanskrit word Manjusa means a 'box'. These boxes were made from bamboo, Jute-Straw, and paper inside which the devotees kept their ceremonial materials.


A 2500-year-old folk art, the history of Madhubani paintings is said to date back to the time of Ramayana, when king Janaka asked an artist to capture his daughter Sita's wedding to prince Rama. These paintings were usually created by women on walls and floors of homes during festivals, ceremonies or special occasions. Having originated in the Mithila region in Bihar, this form of painting, also known as Mithila art, has been in practice in areas around Bihar and Nepal.



OBRA CARPET

Premium Quality Handwoven Carpets

The pile carpet as we all know took birth only 300 years ago during the Mughal period and flourished due to the royal patronage offered to the carpet industry. It is since then that the carpets started being made at Obra. It produces old designs based on the Indo-Persian style and and also floral geometrical patterns. Also, cotton carpets are being made here with patterns, including simple lines, geometric designs and symmetric motifs.

Uniqueness & Brilliance

The uniqueness in the Paper Mache from Bihar lies in the ornamentation through the popular Madhubani Art. The products have an unearthly texture which gives the feeling of rawness to the Folk Art. The process involves making paper pulp by soaking Newspapers, Adhesive, Multani Mitti and Fenugreek powder for a few days in water. Products are created using this pulp and left to dry.
